## PAST EXHIBITIONS: MEMBERS' SUMMER EXHIBITION & "LAND OF THE PARROTS" MARION LYNK

MARION LYNK makes oil paintings and linocut prints, currently focusing on Australian birds, particularly parrots. She would love to do a series of landscapes and/or other animals and birds. Marion says the most important thing is to get life and personality into the painting. Marion spoke with The Foundry: "I use photographic reference - sometimes several different photographs to get the details right. I have found it is much better to work with quality materials from the beginning rather than try to fix the colours on a painting painted with inferior oil paint. The drawings, linocut prints and oil paintings are all made in my studio which is attached to my home. Lino cut prints begin with a drawing, refined and copied several times, lines thickened etc. to suit the medium of linocut carving. With relief printing you get a reverse image from the plate. Prints take several days to dry as I use oil based inks...they have a lovely opaque vividness to them. From start to finish my oil paintings take several weeks and the linocut prints up to two weeks I have been making art since I was about nine years old. My grandmother got me started! I used to paint pictures of our pet cats. Later on I worked and sold art in a gallery in Cairns and at various art markets in Far North Queensland. I trained as a

Graphic Artist/ Animator/Illustrator and worked in that field for around 30 years. I'm inspired by the amazing variety, colour, and beauty of our native species. I have so many Australian bird books. I love old botanical and fauna illustrations! I'm inspired by Elizabeth Gould, George Raper,

E Gostelow, William T Cooper...and more."

An exhibition of new acrylic paintings and charcoal/pastel works on paper presenting emotional, sensual and dynamic figures based on gesture through figurative abstraction.

This exhibition seeks to bring the experience of virtual life drawing into the gallery space. Both artists have used Covid-19 lockdowns to immerse in a figure drawing movement enabled via the social media platforms of Instagram and Zoom. Artists from all over the world have been able to connect from their working environment into the model's own domain where the model is empowered to choose how they want their presence to be posed.

Luann is located in our region while Eric is located in the United States. The use of audio visual and digital media will bring the online world (and Eric's presence) further into the exhibition space. If possible, Zoom workshops for small groups, artists' talks and drawing events will be integrated into this exhibition.

## NEXT EXHIBITION: "READING BETWEEN THE LINES" JUDITH ROBERTS & KERRY HANDWERK

Reading between the lines is an exhibition of textile/mixed media works by Shepparton artists Judith Roberts and Kerry Handwerk. It is a collaborative enterprise – the artists have consulted closely to plan who might do what to illustrate the theme, and to critique each other's work. There is a rich variety of form in this exhibition, including workson boards and canvases; books and scrolls; fabric wall hangings;

vessels and boxes. In scale, the works range from a tiny book, only 0.5cm square, to wall hangings of 150cm by 50cm. Media and processes have been combined in innovative ways, notably Kerry's use of lettering, encaustic wax and carving. Both artists

make use of leaves and leaf prints in their work, as they explore their theme both literally and metaphorically. And as an added bonus both artists will be sharing their expertise in the form of workshops (see below).




#### MARCH MOVIE LOVERS: LIMITED SCREENINGS FROM MID MARCH

BLAK DOT GALLERY, based in Narrm (Melbourne), is the leading gallery for contemporary First Nations art in Australia. Blak Dot Gallery was established in 2011 as a contemporary First Nations artist-run space to showcase contemporary artworks from world Indigenous cultures.

Blak Dot Gallery enables First Nations people to continually redefine and evolve contemporary culture through First Nations art, culture and cultural protocols. Blak Dot Gallery works with a strong network of First Nations artists from all over Victoria and Australia and has an ongoing commitment to ensuring First Nations artists have opportunities and access to a professional gallery environment. We deliver a vibrant and innovative exhibition schedule, catering to solo, group and community work, host regular community events, workshops, panel discussions, lectures, artists markets, and we are an a core participant to six major arts festivals across Melbourne which facilitates the engagement of Blak Dot's community with a wider audience. Through Blak Dot Gallery, First Nations artists who work in non-traditional and mixed-media, have an opportunity to present their interpretation of lived experiences in contemporary society.

Our work gives insight into the cultural values and experiences of Indigenous communities through the creative use of modern practice. At Blak Dot Gallery we are committed to working with the following values:

Sovereignty: We are a First Nations led organisation that places primacy on the voices of First Nations peoples in everything that we do. We encourage and support self-determination through artistic and cultural expression.

Reciprocity: We embrace and are embraced by the communities around us. We acknowledge that our communities contribute to the vibrancy of our organisation and seek to support the positive development of the communities we work within.

Respect: We are an inclusive and safe space for all – particularly so for women, young people and people from the LGBTQI community.

Vibrancy: We strive to be a dynamic organisation that continually redefines and evolves contemporary First Nations culture.

Leadership: The leadership of our organisation is centred around First Nations cultural ways and protocols. We lead and operate our organisation according to First Nations values and knowledges.

Blak Dot Gallery also provides opportunities to teach and mentor aspiring Indigenous curators and art workers. We offer a dedicated critical Indigenous learning space for First Nation Creatives, Blakademy. Blakademy is now home to five community groups and individual artists. Blakademy has hot desks for study or group workshops, reading and writing, as well as a large collection of global and local Indigenous and non-European diasporic texts (catalogues, monographs, anthologies, magazines).
